
Demo – Jeff will demonstrate flying saucer boxes.

Show and Tell



Ken told us about his trip to Africa with fiancée, Beverly, where he brought donations to a school consisting of tops for the students to spin. Neither the students, nor their teacher had ever seen them. In the photo, Ken holds a piece of Dedham maple on which he used a large glue block on the base to hold it on the lathe for support to compensate for weight in turning. It's top was shaped with a hand held router. He turned the outer body with a 3/8" spindle gouge. Still to be done is dyeing and applying a finish. The wood is not stabilized and may move some more.

Ken is leading a rotation at the Eighth New England Woodturning symposium on May 9th on "Working with Distresed Wood"







Paul O'Neil showed several items. On the left side are two spindle gouges with new handles he turned and a Yew rolling pin.
