Glenn Shaffer announced that he spoke to Bob Monaghan who told him that he needs to have hip replacement surgery soon. He is looking to hire and train someone to take over for him at South Shore Bearing in the interim.

Demonstration

The demonstration was a natural edge bowl turned by Steve.







Top row of photos (1-r)- Steve shows the bowl blank (Mulberry) with a one inch Forstner bit drilled hole to accommodate a four prong spur drive or a wood screw. Steve prefers the drive spur since it enables balancing the high and low natural edge of the bowl but chose to use a wood screw for this demonstration.

Center photo has the blank mounted on the lathe between centers ready for turning.

In the picture at the right, the bottom is being formed. For this, Steve uses a pull stroke with his bowl gouge. In rounding the base for the tenon, Steve uses a small spindle gouge to shape this. After the bottom shape has been started, you need to cut from the top of the blank where the bark begins toward the foot to avoid losing too much of the bark from spinning off.







Left photo has the outside of the bowl shaped and turned around between centers preparatory to begin hollowing. Center photo shows hollowing underway. Right photo has the bowl now finish turned off the lathe except for the foot which still needs work.

Charlie McCarthy - a long stem goblet turned from Canary wood



Lenny Mandeville Longworth chuck and depth gauges



Mike Veno showed us a wood Frisbee he made for a boy scout troop. The center is plywood with several segmented Birch strips around the outside. The inside is turned as a shallow bowl.





Lenny Langevin's Eye bowl of Mahogany



Andy - Eastern Red Cedar vase mounted on a stone base with epoxy. He used a one inch bar in hollowing it out. He added a Grape vine to the outside by fastening it with escutcheon pins.





Ken Lindgren holds a spalted Copper Beech bowl with a Urethane finish. The center photo has his "Seascape" bowl which he partially bleached and dyed using an acrylic finish. The wood bleach is Kleen-Strip which is a two part setup. Ken made the two front feet shorter than the foot in the rear to facilitate it's appearance when displayed. The dyes, bleach & finish are all water base. Ken used gold paint on the outside edge.



Nigel shows a shallow bowl turned from green Cherry which he turned thin and allowed to dry some in hopes it would warp slightly before applying dye (Transtint) with an airbrush and then piercing a predrawn design around the base.



Tim Rix showed us a small bowl he had hollowed for potpourri from Apple.





Jeyna had a natural edge bowl she turned with assistance from Wally, Pablo & Wayne from Beech. She carved it to disguise the cracks in it. Jeyna's second bowl - warm Honey Locust turned with assistance from Steve which she plans to donate to her sailing instructor.



Wally had originally turned a closed form from a 40 year old Wisteria tree. He wasn't satisfied with the result so he turned it into an open natural edge bowl.



Glenn holds a Maple baseball bat he turned with the help of a steady rest. The next photo shows Glenn's two desk sets with click pens turned and assembled from kits. On the left he burned in "Captain Fred" and added felt to the bottom. On the right is a stand he made for Fred's wife, Judy.







Steve showed us a large natural edge Beech bowl which developed a crack in the bottom. Center photo is a small Maple bowl he turned with an oil and wax finish and on the right an Ambrosia Maple bowl.
