

Frank shows finished product and introduces Pete. Drive fixture fits bored hole in pith free honey locus blank. A tenon is then turned for mounting in chuck. This speeds production as Pete turns 30-40 natural edge bowls a week.









Pete attacks the blank, literally, to remove as much material as quickly as possible. Rub the bevel - forget it!

Tools are kept sharp using a Oneway Wolverine System and Ellsworth grinding jig. Mike Green showed us how.









Using a shearing cut the interior is hollowed with lightning speed. Frank produced the finished bowl, less power sanding in an hour, describing in great detail what he was doing, while he was turning. The finished product!
