

It's the Grind, Dude



Peter Teubel demonstrated the Ellsworth Sharpening Jig and the correct use of the gouge.









Peter uses the Ellsworth grind on all his gouges. Grinding using 60 & 80 grit friable wheels, diamond dressed lightly. He does not rub the bevel on outside cuts. Power sands starting with 100 grit. He produces 16 bowls in 12 hours

Friday June 18 2:00PM to 7:00PM Saturday 19 10:00AM to 7:00PM Sunday 20 12:00PM to 6:00PM



SPINDLEOLOGY



(1)	PLINTH	Straight Sided Base
(2)	TORUS	Large Semi-Circular Shape
(3)	SCOTIA	Sunk-in Ovod
(4)	OGEE	"S" Shape Usually Asymmetrical (Large Bulge Below is Ogee (Cyma- Recta)
(5)	ASTRAGAL	Semi-Circular Form (Smaller than a Torus)
(6)	NECK	Straight Section in upper Area
(7)	OVOLO	Protruding Segment of an ellipse

(8)QUARTER Hollow QUARTER Round (10) BALL Can Be Elongated into an ellipse

(9-10) QUIRK Transition Between Elements 9 & 10

(9-10) FLAT End Of Quarter Round (11) BEAD Bead Is Cut Into Surface


(Astragal Protrudes Above) (12) FILLETS 3 Stair Stepped In Reverse

(13) OGEE Large Bulge Above (Ogee, Cyma-Reversa)

(14) CAVETTO (Cove) Semi-Circular Hollow

Uniform Series Of Beads. 3 or More (15) REED

(16) ABACUS Straight Sided Section At Top
