

**Demonstration** Jimmy Clewes

**South Shore Arts Festival** - Ken reported that the Cohasset South Shore Arts Festival grossed \$2300 this year versus only \$1400 last year, a big improvement, Saturday being the biggest single day. One problem was a lack of egress to the demonstration booth in the back. There were only 100 vendors this year as opposed to 120 normally, so the space was altered causing the problem.

**Experimental faceplate** - Nigel brought up a discussion on his new faceplate with sheetmetal screws inserted at an angle instead of straight into the end grain of the piece to be turned. He commented that the straight ones held and the ones inserted at an angle let go. Wally suggested gluing a waste block on the base to mount the piece to the lathe as a solution. Bob Sutter suggested that the angled screws should be more than adequate to hold the piece onto the lathe with.

**Jimmy Clewes demo/workshop** - Bob Allen reported that there is still some space available for the hands on Wednesday, July 27<sup>th</sup> for the Jimmy Clewes workshop. Our July 26 meeting will start at 6PM and run for 3 ½ hours so there is time for Jimmy Clewes to do his demonstration. Admission is \$20 and may be paid at the door.

Club Banner - Dusty suggested getting a new banner to display the club name at shows that is more rectangular in shape than the square one we currently use. Bob Scott mentioned that banners at FedEx are available inexpensively with a 3 foot by 5 foot banner costing only \$135. Charlie said he would look into a new sign and research the cost and other variables and report back to the club on his findings at a future meeting.

The hands on / Nigel's annual summer cookout was discussed. It is requested that attendees bring their own chairs as well as a pot luck dish of some kind in addition to turning projects and tools. There will be two tents and early members can help with their setup.

Since the occasion is also a surprise 90<sup>th</sup> birthday party for Hank, it was proposed by Ken that members bring a turning to give to Hank to donate to a charity of his choice. Andy suggested having everyone sign a book for Hank as a keepsake of the event. Bill Dooley proposed that we give Hank a bowl that all the members have signed that he can keep. I proposed having a group photo taken at the party with Hank in the middle as a keepsake. Andy's wife Jamie will be our photographer.

**AAW symposium** - David Rice, Ian Manley and Wayne Miller gave a recap of the AAW symposium. David said that much of what was being demonstrated had been done before. But that they had good people as demonstrators who knew what they were talking about.

Ian reported that the gallery at the symposium also had two other shows making it confusing to attendees. But that one thing he was especially impressed with was an item for sale called "The Round Ripper" for cutting turning blanks and a jig named "The Little Ripper" for cutting boards from a log "-that actually work". Wayne said the demos were misnamed but that the quality of the filming and the sound were better however than in the past with more cameras.

Wayne said that he especially enjoyed the demonstration by Craig Timmerman on multi axis turnings and that the club should look into having him as a demonstrator in the future.

#### Demonstration

Ken Lindgren multi-axis turning demonstration was rescheduled to 2012. Ian Manley gave a presentation on the features of the new club Powermatic 3520B lathe. It has 20 ½" diameter capacity and a 35" bed.( <a href="http://content.powermatic.com/whitepapers/1352001">http://content.powermatic.com/whitepapers/1352001</a> whitepaper.pdf for more details)

Among his comments are that the head stock slides back and forth, the banjo has very little vibration. The motor power is delivered through a pair of two-range, multi-groove pulleys connected by a Poly V-belt. Changing between the 50-1200 and 125-3200 RPM ranges is fast, easy and tool-free using the front-mounted tension levers and access door.

All motor controls are mounted on the front panel of the power head to be easily accessible You don't have to have a positive lock to loosen the chuck. The 85 lb. tailstock will not come off without a pin being removed. There are 24 indexing positions and four different locations. It has outriggers for pattern pieces to be displayed when turning a duplicate. *The lathe is available for members use anytime*.




