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They will be on display from September 20th until November 4th. Pick up will be on the 5th. The show will run from October 5th thru the 7th. The reception is Friday night from 5:00 until 7:00. On Saturday & Sunday Len Langevin & Ken Lindgren will do demos at the Arboretum. Hours are 10-5 each day. The club will supply drinks.

The Audubon Open House is Saturday December 1st. The display of turned items for sale will run for two weeks after that. Drop off items November 26<sup>th</sup> through the 29<sup>th</sup> at their facility. Emily has final say on display.

Turning flowers by Michael Veno










Mike began by explaining that he uses a convex grind to his skew using an 80 grit sanding belt. He then sharpens it on a diamond stone with an extra fine surface to which he adds a little water. Finally he buffs it before using it.





Pictured is an oversized profile of a skew specially ground to facilitate turning flowers on the lathe. In this mockup we see that it features a rounded convex profile to the grind as opposed to the concave version. Mike tells us this is a more user friendly version and easier to avoid catches with.

He likes to begin by selecting green pieces of wood measuring 1/2 to 3/4 of an inch. Wood should also be straight with no bends.

He began by turning up the speed on the lathe to 1500 rpm. There should be no ghost images for this - or your flower may be missing some petals. He uses the point of the skew to "peel" back the bark to form the petals. After he has a few rows, he shapes the remainder of the stem.

Mike used a cue tip with some dye to wick the color into the petals. Sometimes he uses a different color for the center of the flower. He hasn't tried this technique on larger samples yet.

#### Show and Tell










Lenny M. has been experimenting with polyester resin and burls. The first is with dyed yellow resin, the second used a blue green dye, and the third a yellow colored resin filled burl bowl. He decided the crack in this pieced needed a zipper so he installed one. Creative move!







McCarthy showed a natural edge goblet.

Andy showed two bowls. A woman in Concord wanted some pieces turned to use as gifts. He cores these two pieces. The one on the left was bleached the one on the right was dyed. He finished them using a water base urethane.

Charlie's goblet was finished with /6 coats of Tung oil plus 6 coats of Wipe On Poly







Joe Centrino attended Arrowmont and took instruction from Dave Ellsworth with Nigel helping out in Gatlinberg, Tennessee for a week. He turned bowls. This was from Poplar and unfortunately has a hole in the bottom. He showed us a Maple burl piece turned before he attended there.

Fred holds a maple bowl he turned at Steve's house. Nice figure



Kevin showed a "Flying saucer" box, a natural edge bowl turned from Apple [nice color], and a large platter he turned and had an associate artist engrave with some rings and other decoration as shown. This is a piece of berniewood.



New member Chad holds a natural edge Choke Cherry cup turned from a tree in his yard. He finished it with mineral oil.



Steve holds a large Poplar platter with an incised and dyed resin ring from Aluma
Light resin



Steve showed us what started as a punky bowl to which he added resin -dyed red for strength and then turned.







Steve scored a Red Oak Onion burl in Falmouth which he turned into a bowl with a rolled edge and finished with sanding sealer. It's 19 inches in diameter, a half inch thick, and weighs about 15 pounds.


